PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD

First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-7

Isaiah describes the pain and insults of the Servant of God. Yet he sounds hopeful when describing God as his help, knowing he will not be disgraced.

Second Reading: Philippians 2:6-11 Paul exults Christ's great sacrifice of humbling himself to become human and die on the cross. He explains that this is why we should now realize the importance of honoring both his name and memory.

Gospel: Mark 14:1-15:47

Mark describes the events leading up to Christ's crucifixion. The Last Supper is described, explaining where the Eucharist began. Judas betrays Jesus, and his suffering at the hands of the Sanhedrin (Council) is detailed.

The Saint of the Week

St. Katharine Drexel

(March 3)

St. Katharine Drexel is the second Americanborn saint to be canonized by the Catholic Church. She was born in Philadelphia on November 26, 1858.

In 1887, while touring Europe, the Drexel sisters were given a private audience with Pope Leo XIII. They were seeking missionaries to help with the Indian missions they were financing. The Pope looked to Katharine and suggested she, herself, become a missionary. Katharine decided she would give herself and her inheritance to God through service to both Native Americans and African Americans. Katharine began her six-month postulancy at the Sisters of Mercy Convent in Pittsburgh in 1889.

On February 12, 1891, Katharine made her first vows as a religious and dedicated herself to working for the American Indians and African-Americans in the Western United States.

Taking the name Mother Katharine, she established a religious congregation called the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored, whose members would work for the betterment of those they were called to serve.

From the age of 33 until her death in 1955, she dedicated her life and her fortune to this work. She took part in opening a mission school in Santa Fe, New Mexico, another one west of the Mississippi River, and one for the blacks in the southern part of the United States. In 1915, Katherine founded Xavier University in New Orleans, the first Catholic University in the United States for African-Americans.

By the time of her death, she had more than 500 Sisters teaching in 63 schools throughout the country and she established 50 missions for Native Americans in 16 different states.

Mother Katharine died on March 3, 1955 at the age of 96. She is buried at her order's motherhouse. Neither of Katharine's sisters had any children, so after her death, the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament lost the Drexel fortune that supported their ministries. However, the order continues to pursue Katharine's mission with the African-Americans and Native Americans in 21 states and in Haiti.

St. Katharine was beatified on November 20, 1988 and canonized on October 1, 2000 by Pope John Paul II. Relics of St. Katharine can be found at St. Raphael the Archangel Catholic Church in Raleigh, North Carolina, and in the Day Chapel of Saint Katharine Drexel Parish in Sugar Grove, Illinois.

The Senior Meeting is open to all seniors and





Polskie Duszpasterstwo w Parafii św. Bernarda i św. Stanisława Kostki



<u>Kazanie św. Andrzeja z Krety,</u> <u>biskupa</u>

Chodźcie, wstąpmy i my na Górę Oliwną! Biegnijmy naprzeciw Chrystusa, który powraca dzisiaj z Betanii i spieszy dobrowolnie na tę swoją świętą i czcigodną mękę, aby wypełnić do końca tajemnicę naszego zbawienia.

Przychodzi więc i z własnej woli odbywa drogę w stronę Jerozolimy Ten, który dla nas zstąpił z nieba, aby wespół z sobą wywyższyć tych, co leżą w prochu ziemi, i posadzić ich, jak mówi Pismo, "ponad wszelką Zwierzchnością i Władzą, i Mocą, i Panowaniem, i ponad wszelkim innym imieniem wzywanym".

Przychodzi zaś nie z dumą i przepychem jak ten, co chciwie szuka sławy. On "nie będzie się spierał ani krzyczał i nikt nie usłyszy Jego głosu". Będzie natomiast cichy i łagodny, lichego odzienia i skromny w urządzaniu wystawności swojego wejścia.

Nuże więc, biegnijmyż i my razem z Chrystusem, któremu spieszno na mękę. Naśladujmy tych, co wyszli Mu na spotkanie, ale nie w ten sposób, by słać na drodze gałązki palm i oliwek oraz kłaść kosztowne szaty, lecz my sami, jak tylko możemy, rozścielmy się na ziemi w pokorze ducha i prostocie serca, abyśmy przyjęli nadchodzące Słowo i pochwycili Boga, który nigdzie nie daje się ująć.

On bowiem cieszy się z tego, że może nam się okazać łagodnym, On, który naprawdę jest łagodny i "wstępuje na zachód" naszej mizernej słabości, aby przyjść do nas, obcować z nami i przyciągnąć nas do siebie przez pokrewieństwo z nami.

Bo chociaż przez ofiarę z naszej ludzkiej natury "wstąpił na niebiosa niebios, na wschód słońca", czyli na wyżyny własnej chwały i Bóstwa, to jednak nie wyrzeknie się nigdy przywiązania do rodzaju ludzkiego, lecz będzie dźwigał naturę człowieka z prochu ziemi do coraz wyższej chwały, aż wreszcie jednocząc się z nią, udzieli jej swej nieskończonej godności.

A zatem siebie samych ścielmy przed Chrystusem, a nie tuniki, martwe gałęzie i łodygi krzewów tracących zieleń, gdy staną się pokarmem, i przez krótki tylko czas radujących oczy. Obleczmy się natomiast w Jego łaskę, czyli w Niego samego. Pismo św. bowiem mówi: "Wy wszyscy, którzy zostaliście ochrzczeni w Chrystusie, przyoblekliście się w Chrystusa". Kładźmy się pod Jego nogi jak rozścielone tuniki.

Nasze grzechy były czerwone jak szkarłat, teraz obmyci w zbawczych wodach chrztu osiągnęliśmy lśniącą biel wełny, ofiarujmy Zwycięzcy śmierci już nie gałązki palmowe, ale wieńce naszego zwycięstwa. Wysławiajmy Go w każdy dzień świętą pieśnią razem z izraelskimi dziećmi, potrząsając duchowymi gałązkami i mówiąc: "Błogosławiony, który przychodzi w imię Pańskie".

2024 LENTEN REGULATIONS

1. The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "Paschal Fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus, and to prepare

ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily His Resurrection. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.

On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted, and two (2) **smaller meals, which, if added**

together, would not exceed the main meal in quantity.

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

2. The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and Abstinence "substantially", or as a whole, is a serious obligation.

3. The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.

4. The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, February 18 to The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, May 26, 2024.

*Canon 920, §1. All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year.

From Fr. Marcin's Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

At the heart of the Palm Sunday celebration is Christ's humility. Humility is above all God's way: God humbles himself to walk with his people, to put up with their infidelity. This is clear when we read the story of the Exodus. How humiliating for the Lord to hear all that grumbling, all those complaints against Moses, but ultimately against Him, their Father, who brought them out of slavery and was leading them on the journey through the desert to the land of freedom.

This week, Holy Week, which leads us to Easter, we will take this path of Jesus' own humiliation. Only in this way will this week be "holy" for us too! We will feel the contempt of the leaders of his people and their attempts to trip him up. We will be there at the betrayal of Judas. We will see the Lord arrested and carried off like a criminal; abandoned by his disciples, dragged before the Sanhedrin, condemned to death, beaten and insulted. We will hear Peter, the "rock" among the disciples, deny him three times. We will hear the shouts of the crowd, egged on by their leaders, who demand that Barabbas be freed and Jesus crucified. We will see him mocked by the soldiers, robed in purple and crowned with thorns. And then, as he makes his sorrowful way beneath the cross, we will hear the jeering of the people and their leaders, who scoff at his being King and Son of God.

The way of humility is the only way. There can be no humility without humiliation. During this week, we are invited to set about with determination along this same path of humility, with immense love for Jesus, our Lord and Savior. Love will guide us and give us strength. For where he is, we too shall be!
