Kazanie św. Leona Wielkiego, papieża

Pan ukazał przed wybranymi świadkami swoją chwałę i tę postać cielesną, którą dzielił wspólnie z innymi, rozjaśnił takim blaskiem, że Jego twarz stała się podobna do blasku słońca, a szaty dorównywały bieli śniegu.

W przemieniu Chrystusa chodziło głównie o to, aby z serc uczniów usunąć zgorszenie krzyża i by uniżenie dobrowolnie przyjętej męki nie zakłóciło wiary tych, którym została objawiona wspaniałość ukrytej godności.

Z nie mniejszą też troską podbudowywał Pan swoim przemieniem nadzieję Kościoła świętego w tym celu, by całe ciało Chrystusowe dowiedziało się, jaką zostało obdarowane mocą przemiany, i aby wszystkie jego członki mogły się spodziewać udziału w tej chwale, którą wcześniej rozbłysła Głowa.

Powiedział już o tym sam Pan, gdy mówił o majestacie swojego przyjścia: "Wtedy sprawiedliwi jaśnieć będą jak słońce w królestwie Ojca swego". To samo głosi św. Paweł Apostoł: "Sądzę, że utrapienia obecnego czasu nie są godne przyszłej chwały, która się ma w nas objawić". I znowu: "Umarliście i życie wasze jest ukryte z Chrystusem w Bogu. Gdy się ukaże Chrystus, życie wasze, wtedy i wy razem z Nim ukażecie się w chwale".

W cudzie przemienia, który miał utwierdzić apostołów i doprowadzić ich do wszelkiej wiedzy, kryje się jeszcze inne pouczenie.

Oto bowiem w czasie jego trwania ukazali się Mojżesz i Eliasz (to znaczy Prawo i prorocy) rozmawiający z Panem, aby w obecności owych pięciu mężów dopełniło się jak najprawdziwiej to, o czym powiedziano: "Na słowie dwóch albo trzech świadków opiera się cała sprawa".

Przystają bowiem nawzajem do siebie stronice obydwu przymierzy i Ten, którego wcześniejsze znaki obiecywały pod zasłoną tajemnic, ukazuje się teraz wyraźny i przejrzysty w blasku obecnej chwały. Albowiem jak powiedział św. Jan: "Prawo zostało nadane przez Mojżesza, łaska zaś i prawda przyszły przez Jezusa Chrystusa". W Nim stała się rzeczywistością obietnica zawarta w prorockich figurach i dopełniło się to wszystko, ku czemu zmierzały nakazy Prawa, ponieważ On przez swoją obecność stwierdza prawdę przepowiedni, a łaską swoją czyni możliwym zachowywanie przykazań.

Niechże więc przez głoszenie świętej Ewangelii utwierdzi się wiara wszystkich chrześcijan i niechaj nikt się nie wstydzi Chrystusowego krzyża, przez który świat został odkupiony. Z tego też powodu niech się nikt nie boi cierpieć dla sprawiedliwości ani niech nie wątpi w osiągnięcie obiecanej nagrody, ponieważ przez pracę zdąża się do wytchnienia i przez śmierć do życia. Skoro Chrystus przyjął na siebie całą słabość naszej nędzy, z Nim razem zwyciężymy to, co On zwyciężył, i otrzymamy wszystko, co nam obiecał, jeśli tylko będziemy trwać w wierze i miłości względem Niego.

2025 LENTEN REGULATIONS

1. The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "Paschal Fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus, and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily His Resurrection. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.

On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted, and two (2) smaller meals, which, if added together, would not exceed the main meal in quantity.

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

- **2**. The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and Abstinence "substantially", or as a whole, is a serious obligation.
- **3.** The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.
- 4. The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, March 9 to The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, June 15.2025.

*Canon 920, §1. All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year.

The Saint of the Week



March 19th

Everything we know about the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus comes from Scripture, and that has seemed too little for those who made up legends about him.

We know he was a carpenter, a working man, for the skeptical Nazarenes ask about Jesus, "Is this not the carpenter's son?" He wasn't rich, for when he took Jesus to the Temple to be circumcised and Mary to be purified, he offered the sacrifice of two turtledoves or a pair of pigeons, allowed only for those who could not afford a lamb.

Despite his humble work and means, Joseph came from a royal lineage. Luke and Matthew disagree some about the details of Joseph's genealogy, but they both mark his descent from David, the greatest king of Israel. Indeed, the angel who first tells Joseph about Jesus greets him as "son of David," a royal title used also for Jesus.

We know Joseph was a compassionate, caring man. When he discovered Mary was pregnant after they had been betrothed, he knew the child was not his but was as yet unaware that she was carrying the Son of God. He knew women accused of adultery could be stoned to death, so he resolved to send her away quietly to not expose her to shame or cruelty. An angel came to Joseph in a dream and told him, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." He did as the angel told him and took Mary as his wife.

When the angel came again to tell him that his family was in danger, he immediately left

everything he owned, all his family and friends, and fled to a strange country with his young wife and the baby. He waited in Egypt without question until the angel told him it was safe to go back.

We know Joseph loved Jesus. His one concern was for the safety of this child entrusted to him. Not only did he leave his home to protect Jesus, but upon his return settled in the obscure town of Nazareth out of fear for Jesus' life. When Jesus stayed in the Temple we are told Joseph (along with Mary) searched with great anxiety for three days for Him. We also know that Joseph treated Jesus as his own son, for over and over the people of Nazareth say of Jesus, "Is this not the son of Joseph?"

We know Joseph respected God. He followed God's commands in handling the situation with Mary and going to Jerusalem to have Jesus circumcised and Mary purified after Jesus' birth. We are told that he took his family to Jerusalem every year for Passover, something that could not have been easy for a working man.

Since Joseph does not appear in Jesus' public life, at His death, or resurrection, many historians believe Joseph probably had died before Jesus entered public ministry.

Joseph is the patron saint of the dying because, assuming he died before Jesus' public life, he died with Jesus and Mary close to him, the way we all would like to leave this earth.

Joseph is also patron saint of the Universal Church, families, fathers, expectant mothers (pregnant women), travelers, immigrants, house sellers and buyers, craftsmen, engineers, and working people in general.

We celebrate two feast days for Joseph: March 19 for Joseph the Husband of Mary and May 1 for Joseph the Worker. March 19 has been the most commonly celebrated feast day for Joseph, and it wasn't until 1955 that Pope Pius XII established the Feast of "St. Joseph the Worker" to be celebrated on May 1. This is also May Day (International Workers' Day) and believed to reflect Joseph's status as the patron of workers.

In art, Joseph is typically portrayed as an older man, with grey hair and a beard, often balding, sometimes appearing frail and a marginal figure next to Mary and Jesus, if not entirely in the background. Some statues of Joseph show his staff topped with flowers. St. Joseph is shown with the attributes of a carpenter's square or tools, the infant Jesus, his lily blossomed staff, two turtle doves, or a spikenard.

From Fr. Marcin's Desk Dear Brothers and Sisters.

On this Second Sunday of Lent, the liturgy reveals to us Jesus transfigured on the mountain, which is the place of light, a fascinating symbol of the unique experience reserved for the three disciples. They go up the mountain with the Master, they see Him immersed in prayer and, at a certain point, "the appearance of his countenance was altered." Accustomed to seeing Him daily in the simple appearance of His humanity, they are astonished as they face that new splendor that also envelops His entire body. Moses and Elijah appear beside Jesus and speak with Him about His Paschal death and Resurrection.

The Transfiguration occurs at a precise moment in Christ's mission, that is, after He has confided to His disciples that He would have to "suffer many things, be killed, and on the third day be raised." Jesus knows that they do not accept the reality of the Cross, and so He wants to prepare them to withstand the scandal of the passion and death on the Cross. This is also our way. No one can reach eternal life if not by following Jesus, carrying their own cross in their earthly life. Each of us has his or her own cross. The Lord reveals to us the end of this journey, which is the Resurrection, by carrying one's own cross.

In this Lent, we are invited to go up the mountain with Jesus! Let us climb the mountain with prayer: silent prayer, heartfelt prayer, prayer that always seeks the Lord. Prayer allows us to see the transfigured cross of our life. The light of Christ enlightens the reality of our life.

Jesus was immersed in an intimate dialogue with the Father, which the Law and the Prophets — Moses and Elijah — also echoed; and as He adhered with His entire being to the Father's will of salvation, including the Cross, the glory of God flooded Him, even shining on the outside. This is how prayer in Christ and in the Holy Spirit transforms the person from the inside and can illuminate others and the surrounding world.
