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

MOST HOLY BODY & BLOOD OF CHRIST

First Reading: Genesis 14:18-20

Melchizedek, a priest of God, prayed that Abram would be blessed by God. He also praised God for delivering Abram's foes into his hands.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

Paul describes Jesus' actions during the last supper. Jesus broke bread and said it was his body given for us, asking that we do the same in remembrance of him. He then passed the cup and called it his blood. Jesus then asked us to break bread in this manner to remember his death until he returns.

Gospel: Luke 9:11b-17

Jesus spoke to a large crowd when his disciples asked that he dismiss the people to give them a chance to find food and lodging. Jesus asked the disciples to give the crowd something to eat, but they had only five loaves of bread and two fish. Jesus then blessed and distributed the food, which fed about 5,000 people. Twelve baskets were then collected from what was left over.


SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION



Święto Bożego Ciała ma swoje początki w średniowieczu i po raz pierwszy obchodzone było w XIII wieku w diecezji Liège w Belgii, w 1246 roku.

Wśród innych cudów eucharystycznych był ten z Bolseny (Włochy), w którym konsekrowana Hostia zaczęła krwawić, podczas gdy kapłan, który wątpił w rzeczywistą obecność Chrystusa w Eucharystii, odprawiał Mszę Świętą.

Tym księdzem był Piotr z Pragi, który udał się do Włoch, aby poprosić o audiencję u papieża. Był w Orvieto z kilkoma kardynałami i teologami, w tym ze świętym Tomaszem. Po powrocie do Czech Piotr z Pragi odprawił mszę w kościele w Bolsenie, gdzie wydarzył się cud. Po zatwierdzeniu jego autentyczności, papież postanowił ustanowić święto Bożego Ciała dla całego Kościoła, a nie tylko dla diecezji Liège, bullą Transiturus de hoc mundo ad Patremw 1264 roku. Zlecił również św. Tomaszowi stworzenie liturgii i hymnów na cześć Jezusa w Najświętszym Sakramencie.

Począwszy od XIV wieku, tradycja Bożego Ciała została wzmocniona i dodano kolejny element: procesje, które zostały ustanowione przez papieża Jana XXII w 1317 roku. Procesje te miały określone zasady, choć nie obejmowały jeszcze procesji z konsekrowaną Hostią. W 1447 roku papież Mikołaj V wprowadził procesję z Eucharystią ulicami Rzymu.

W Hiszpanii święto Bożego Ciała zaczęto obchodzić na początku XIV wieku. Zachowały się dokumenty mówiące o pierwszych obchodach i przebiegu procesji. Na przykład istnieje tekst opata Alonso Sáncheza Gordillo (1561-1644) z 1612 r., który opowiada o tym, jak procesja z monstrancją odbywała się w Sewilli: "monstrancja była niesiona, ze względu na jej duży ciężar, przez dwunastu mężczyzn [...], którzy byli ubrani w czerwone lniane szaty i byli umieszczeni pod osłoną platform" (Uniwersytet w Almerii).




Z dzieł świętego Tomasza z Akwinu

Jednorodzony Syn Boży chciał, abyśmy mieli udział w Jego Boskiej naturze, stał się więc człowiekiem, aby ludzi uczynić podobnymi Bogu; tę zaś naturę ludzką, którą od nas przyjął, uczynił narzędziem naszego zbawienia. Na ołtarzu krzyża złożył samego siebie w ofierze Bogu, swojemu Ojcu, jako ofiarę pojednania i przelał swoją krew, dzięki której zostaliśmy wykupieni z nieszczęsnej niewoli i obmyci z grzechów. Pod postaciami chleba i wina pozostawił nam swoje Ciało i Krew jako pokarm i napój, i jako wiecznie trwającą pamiątkę tak wielkiej łaski nam danej.

O drogocenna i zbawcza Uczto, godna czci i pełna słodyczy! Cóż może być cenniejszego od niej? Za dawnego Przymierza spożywano mięso cielców i kozłów, obecnie zaś sam Chrystus staje się naszym pokarmem. Cóż więc może być cudowniejszego niż ten sakrament? Ponad wszystkie inne jest on źródłem życiodajnej mocy, oczyszcza z grzechów, pomnaża cnoty, obdarza obfitością duchowych łask. Jest ofiarowany w Kościele za żywych i za umarłych, aby wszystkim przynosił pożytek, bo został ustanowiony dla zbawienia wszystkich. Ten tylko zdoła wysłowić jego słodycz, kto jej w nim zakosztował i kto wspomina niezrównaną miłość Chrystusa objawioną w Jego męce. Tę nieskończoną miłość swoją Chrystus pragnął przelać w serca wiernych, i w tym celu ustanowił ten sakrament, gdy wraz z uczniami spożywał ostatnią wieczerzę, tuż przed odejściem z tego świata do Ojca. Ustanowił go jako trwała pamiątkę swej męki, pamiątkę spełniającą dawne obietnice, największy ze wszystkich Jego cudów; miała być ona pociechą dla tych, których zasmuciło Jego odejście ze świata.

The Saint of the Week



John the Baptist was a contemporary of Christ who was known for evangelization and his baptizing of Jesus Christ.

John the Baptist was born through the intercession of God to Zachariah and Elizabeth, who was otherwise too old to bear children. According to scriptures, the Angel Gabriel visited Elizabeth and Zachariah to tell them they would have a son and that they should name him John. Zachariah was skeptical, and for this he was rendered mute until the time his son was born and named John, in fulfillment of God's will.

When Elizabeth was pregnant with John, she was visited by Mary, and John leapt in her womb. This revealed to Elizabeth that the child Mary carried was to be the Son of God.

John began public ministry around 30 A, and was known for attracting large crowds across the province of Judaea and around the Jordan River. When Jesus came to him to be baptized, John recognized Him and said, "It is I who need baptism from you."

Jesus told John to baptize Him anyway, which he did, whereupon the heavens opened, and the Spirit of God was seen like a dove. The voice of God spoke, saying, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."

John instructed his followers to turn to Christ, calling Him the "Lamb of God," and these people were among the first Christians.

Following his baptism of Christ, John's popularity grew so much that he alarmed King Herod. Herod ordered him arrested and imprisoned.

John spoke with Herod on several occasions and condemned his marriage to his half-brother's wife.

This condemnation would be his downfall as King Herod promised to grant a wish to his

daughter. In revenge for John the Baptist's condemnation of her mother's scandalous marriage to Herod, she asked for John's head. King Herod reluctantly obliged. John the Baptist died sometime between 33 and 36 AD.

John the Baptist's feast day is June 24, and the anniversary of his death is August 29 and is sometimes celebrated with a second feast. John the Baptist is the patron saint of Jordan, Puerto Rico, French Canada and many other places.



From Fr. Marcin's Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Twice the Apostle Paul, writing to the community in Corinth, recalls this command of Jesus in his account of the institution of the Eucharist: "Do this." That is, take bread, give thanks and break it; take the chalice, give thanks, and share it. Jesus gives the command to repeat this action by which He instituted the memorial of His own Pasch, and in so doing gives us His Body and His Blood. This action reaches us today: it is the "doing" of the Eucharist which always has Jesus as its subject, but which is made real through our poor hands anointed by the Holy Spirit.

"Do this." Jesus on a previous occasion asked His disciples to "do" what was so clear to Him, in obedience to the will of the Father. In the Gospel passage that we have just heard, Jesus says to the disciples in front of the tired and hungry crowds: "Give them something to eat yourselves." Indeed, it is Jesus who blesses and breaks the loaves and provides sufficient food to satisfy the whole crowd, but it is the disciples who offer the five loaves and two fish. Jesus wanted it this way: that, instead of sending the crowd away, the disciples would put at his disposal what little they had. There is another gesture: the pieces of bread, broken by the holy and venerable hands of Our Lord, pass into the poor hands of the disciples, who distribute these to the people. This too is the disciples "doing" with Jesus; with Him they are able to "give them something to eat." Clearly this miracle was not intended merely to satisfy hunger for a day, but rather it signals what Christ wants to accomplish for the salvation of all mankind, giving His own flesh and blood. This needs always to happen through those two small actions: offering the few loaves and fish which we have; receiving the bread broken by the hands of Jesus and giving it to all.





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
