TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Isaiah 66:18-21

Isaiah portrays a time when people from many nations will gather in Jerusalem and proclaim God's glory. God's messengers will teach many nations about God. Just as the Israelites bring offerings, these messengers will bring people from all nations to worship.

Second Reading: Hebrews 12:5-7, 11-13

The Hebrews are told that God disciplines those he loves. When a parent disciplines a child, the child usually learns what is expected of him. The Hebrews are encouraged to face life's trials as a form of discipline, and attempt to learn something from them.

Gospel: Luke 13:22- 30

Jesus warns that the door to God's kingdom will be locked for those who ignored his wishes. Many people will come from all nations and take their place in God's kingdom. Others will not be recognized by God, and he will reject them.

Nie znamy czasu, kiedy ma się skończyć ziemia i ludzkość, ani nie wiemy, w jaki sposób wszechświat ma zostać zmieniony. Przemija wprawdzie postać tego świata zniekształcona grzechem, ale pouczeni jesteśmy, że Bóg gotuje nowe mieszkanie i nową ziemię, gdzie mieszka sprawiedliwość, a szcześliwość zaspokoi i przewyższy wszelkie pragnienia pokoju, jakie żywią serca ludzkie. Wtedy to, po pokonaniu śmierci, zmartwychwstana synowie Boży w Chrystusie, i to, co było wsiane w słabości i zepsuciu, odzieje się nieskażonościa, a wobec trwania miłości i jej dzieła całe to stworzenie, które Bóg uczynił dla człowieka, będzie uwolnione od niewoli próżności.

Słyszymy wprawdzie, że na nic człowiekowi się nie przyda, jeśli cały świat zyska, a siebie samego zatraci. Oczekiwanie jedak nowej ziemi nie powinno osłabiać, lecz ma raczej



pobudzaćzapobiegliwość, by uprawiać te ziemie, na której wzrasta owo ciało nowej rodziny ludzkiej, mogące dać pewne wyobrażenie nowego świata. Przeto, choć należy starannie odróżniać postęp ziemski od wzrostu królestwa Chrystusowego, to przecież dla królestwa Bożego nie jest obojetne, jak dalece postęp ten może się przyczynić do lepszego urządzenia społeczności ludzkiej.

The Saint of the Week



Saint Monica, also known as Monica of Hippo, is St. Augustine of Hippo's mother. She was born in 331 A.D. in Tagaste, which is present-day Algeria.

When she was very young, she was married off to the Roman pagan Patricius, who shared his mother's violent temper. Patricius' mother lived with the couple, and the duo's temper flares proved to be a constant challenge to young Monica.

While Monica's prayers and Christian deeds bothered Patricius, he is said to have respected her beliefs.

Three children were born to Monica and Patricius: Augustine, Navigius, and Perpetua. Unfortunately, Monica was unable to baptize her children, and when Augustine fell ill Monica pleaded with Patricius to allow their son to be baptized.

Patricius allowed it, but when Augustine was healthy again, he withdrew his permission.

For years Monica prayed for her husband and mother-in-law, until finally, one year before Patricius' death, she successfully converted them.

As time passed, Perpetua and Navigius entered the religious life, but unfortunately Augustine became lazy and uncouth. This greatly worried Monica, so when Patricius died, she sent the 17-year-old Augustine to Carthage for schooling.

While in Carthage, Augustine became a Manichaean, which was a major religion that saw the world as light and darkness, and when one died, they were removed from the world of matter and returned to the world of light, which is where life comes from.

After Augustine got his education and returned home, he shared his views with Monica, who drove him from her table. Though it is not recorded how much time passed, Monica had a vision that convinced her to reconcile with her wayward son.

Monica went to a bishop, who told her, "the child of those tears shall never perish."

Inspired, Monica followed Augustine to Rome, where she learned he had left for Milan. She continued her perusal and eventually came upon St. Ambrose, who helped her convert Augustine to Christianity following his seventeen-year resistance.

Augustine later wrote a book called Confessions, in which he wrote of Monica's habit of bringing "to certain oratories, erected in the memory of the saints, offerings of porridge, bread, water and wine."

When Monica moved to Milan, a bishop named Ambrose told her wine "might be an occasion of gluttony for those who were already given to drink," so she stopped preparing wine as offerings for the saints.


Augustine wrote: "In place of a basket filled with fruits of the earth, she had learned to bring to the oratories of the martyrs a heart full of purer petitions, and to give all that she could to the poorso that the communion of the Lord's body might be rightly celebrated in those places where, after the example of his passion, the martyrs had been sacrificed and crowned."

After a period of six months, Augustine was baptized in the church of St. John the Baptist at Milan. The pair were led to believe they should spread the Word of God to Africa, but in the Roman city of Civitavecchia, Monica passed away.

Augustine recorded the words she imparted upon him when she realized death was near. "Son, nothing in this world now affords me delight. I do not know what there is now left for me to do or why I am still here, all my hopes in this world being now fulfilled."

She was buried at Ostia, and her body was removed during the 6th century to a hidden crypt in the church of Santa Aurea in Ostia, near the tomb of St. Aurea of Ostia.

In 1430, Pope Martin V ordered her relics to be brought to Rome and many miracles were reported to have occurred along the way. Later, Cardinal d'Estouteville built a church to honor St. Augustine called the Basilica di Sant'Agostino, where her relics were placed in a chapel to the left of the high altar. She is a patron of wives and abuse victims.

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From Fr. Marcin's Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Today's Gospel invites us to reflect on the theme of salvation. Jesus was journeying from Galilee towards Jerusalem when someone asked Him: "Lord, will those who are saved be few?" Jesus does not answer the question directly: there is no need to know how many are saved; rather it is important to know which path leads to salvation. And so it was that Jesus replied saying: "Strive to enter by the narrow door; for many, I tell you, will seek to enter and will not be able."

The image of the door recurs in the Gospel on various occasions and calls to mind the door of the house, of the home, where we find safety, love and warmth. This door is Jesus himself. He is the entrance to salvation. He leads us to the Father. and the door that is Jesus is never closed. It is always open and to all, without distinction, without exclusion, without privileges. Jesus is waiting for you to embrace you, to pardon you. Do not be afraid: He is waiting for you. Take heart, have the courage to enter through His door. Everyone is invited to cross the threshold of this door, to cross the threshold of faith, to enter into His life and to make Him enter our life, so that He may transform it, renew it and give it full and enduring joy.

In our day we pass in front of so many doors that invite us to come in, promising a happiness which later we realize lasts only an instant, exhausts itself with no future. Do not be afraid to cross the threshold of faith in Jesus. to let Him enter our life more and more, to step out of our selfishness, our closure, our indifference to others so that Jesus may illuminate our life with a light that never goes out. It is not a firework, not a flash of light! No, it is a peaceful light that lasts forever and gives us peace.

This narrow door is the Cross that we are invited daily to enter together with Christ. He asks us to open our hearts to Him, to recognize that we are sinners in need of His salvation. His forgiveness and His love in order to have the humility to accept His mercy and to let ourselves be renewed by Him. Jesus tells us in the Gospel that being Christians does not mean having a "label!" To be disciples of Christ we need to be in truth and heart. Being Christian is living and witnessing to faith in the Cross that gives us life.
